Worthington ~ 2003 and beyond

e come together at the end of Worthington's bicentennial year, a year of great celebration. We have heard stories of the founding of this city by people who set out into the wilderness with a plan and a vision for a village where religion, education and a prosperous business community would be central. In song, dance, drama, games, parade and lecture, we have learned and rejoiced over the traditions that are Worthington's heritage. Again, we gather to give thanks for the spirit of Worthington.

Those early settlers would not recognize their city today. Forests and farmland have become residential neighborhoods, soccer fields, parking lots, schools and schoolyards, highways with all manner of machines on them, large business complexes, and many places of worship. The area bounded by orth, South, Morning, and Evening Streets, which once marked the outskirts of the village, we now call 'Old Worthington,' the heart of the larger City of Worthington. Our school system has spread even farther, reaching out to include neighborhoods in surrounding communities. Today, the people of Worthington are a diverse group from many cultures, some unknown to the people of 1803.

With change have come both challenges and opportunities. Economic depressions and differing opinions about local issues have tested the city and will continue to do so. Historically, Worthington's people have taken issues seriously and solved many problems with creativity. We have the opportunity to grow in heart and spirit as we welcome newcomers and fresh points of view.

Worthington's faith community has grown from the start. St. John's Episcopal Church in Worthington and Parts Adjacent was joined almost immediately by Methodists and Presbyterians and now includes numerous Christian denominations and congregations of other faiths, including Jewish and Sikh. Worthington is home to people of many other religions, some of whom have joined us in worship today.

What will Worthington be like in years to come? Will the people of the future value education as we do? Will they work hard at keeping this a vibrant community? Will they value their faith as we do?

The people who came here to establish a community were rich in expectation. Their pioneering spirit carried them through the journey and through the early travails and triumphs of establishing their dream. As we enter our third century, we give thanks for that spirit and for God's blessings on our city. In Worthington's tradition of intentional community building, we welcome you to our interfaith service of celebration and thanksgiving for what Worthington was conceived to be and continues to become.

The WORTHINGTON PASTORS ASSOCIATION welcomes people from other faith traditions who have joined in planning this Service of Thanks and offer these words:

BAHA'I The Baha'i Faith is a world wide religion that focuses on the oneness of humanity and the unity of religion. There have been Baha'is in the central Ohio area since the 1920's and in Worthington since the 1960's. Worthington Baha'is are involved in study circles, devotional meetings, the spiritual education of children, and promoting world peace.

BHUDDIST Bhuddism believes in the dignity and worth of each living being, in respect and compassion for all life and in need for each person to find their own path to enlightenment and to an understanding of the nature of life. Simply put, its basic teachings are: first, to do no harm to any living beings; second, to do good; and third, to purify the mind from impurity.

ISLAM Muslims believe in one God, creator of the universe and all that it contains. The one who is successful in life, who finds inner peace, is the one who submits to the will of God before all else; strives through the tests of this imperfect world to live as an upright, well-mannered, moral person; helps and defends the weak; gives in charity, and prays regularly for forgiveness, in thanks and in reverence to God.

SHINTO The Shinto religion, 'the Way of the Gods,' goes back to the beginnings of the Japanese people. Shinto encompasses the many ways in which Japanese people have worshipped all the deities of heaven and earth. With the acceptance and inclusion of Buddhism in the 6th century, the religious culture of Japan established a tradition of their own faith.

SIKH Sikhism sees all religions as paths to the same God. Sikhism believes that if one is a Christian, one should be a good Muslim, etc.. Sikhs must maintain a unique identity that sets them apart from the crowd, building self-confidence, courage, and integrity. Men and women have always been regarded as equal since Sikhism was founded in 1469 C.E. Gurdwara Sahib Temple was established in Linworth in 1995. The prayer offered at this service is an excerpt from *Sukhmani Sahib*.

UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST Unitarian Universalism is a free church tradition which is many centuries old. The modern movement traces its dual name to two religious groups rooted in the Radical Reformation Era, the Unitarians and Universalists. Ours is a principled, not doctrinal tradition, open to everyone of good will, regardless of age, ability, gender, ethnic origin, color, sexual or affectional orientation, or class.
